



Lucy's Bark Park Rules

Lucy's Bark Park is for overnight guests and their dogs only. Other types of animals are prohibited.

Humans at Lucy's Bark Park:

- Dog owners/handlers are legally responsible for the actions of their dog(s). Any damages resulting from any dog's behavior at the park are attributable to the dog's individual owner/handler.
- The following are not allowed in the dog park: rawhides, food (dog or human), glass containers, alcoholic beverages, or smoking. Small training treats only are allowed.
- Owners/handlers are expected to comply with all applicable ordinances, regulations and laws governing dogs.
- Park patrons are individually responsible for guarding against the risks posed by unleashed dogs.
- Violators of these rules are subject to immediate removal from the dog park.
- Maximum two dogs per individual.
- Owners/handlers must carry a leash for their dog(s) at all times.
- Children under 12 years of age must be accompanied by an adult.
- Clean up after your dog. Poop scoop bags and a waste receptacle are available on the premises for your convenience.
- Owners/handlers must always remain in control and in sight of their dog(s). Do not leave dogs unattended.
- Please fill in any holes your dog might dig.

Dogs at Lucy's Bark Park:

- Puppies under 4 months of age may not use the park.
- Dogs must be spayed/neutered to use the park.
- Aggressive dogs are not allowed. If your dog displays an aggressive temperament, please keep him or her out of the park.
- If a dog fight or bite occurs, contact Security at (812) 936-5555 to report the incident.
- Tennis balls only. Other types of dog toys cause fights.
- Dogs must be up to date on all required vaccinations, which include rabies, Bordetella, and distemper/parvovirus combo vaccines. If your dog is sick, please do not bring him or her to the park.

How to Use Lucy's Bark Park:

- Enter the double-gated transition area only if there are no other dogs or people in it.
- Once in the transition area, remove your dog's leash. Dogs may feel threatened if they are leashed in the presence of unleashed dogs.
- Once you and your dog(s) have entered the park, move away from the entrance to help disperse dogs that have come over to welcome the newcomers.
